NMRTU Sasebo Fellow

Fellows can play an integral role at NMRTU Sasebo. The Fellowship program can forge a vital partnership between Japanese and American healthcare professionals. The primary mission of the Fellowship is to educate Fellows regarding Western medicine, evidence-based practice, and patient-centered care. A secondary mission is for Fellows to act as a liaison and translator with Japanese hospitals during the transfer of acutely ill American patients. The liaison role bridges gaps in cultures and standards of care, and it is immensely rewarding to the Fellows and meaningful to the American patients. The NMRTU Sasebo staff speak English during patient care. Most of the staff will be stationed in Japan for two to three years. Rarely are the NMRTU Sasebo physicians proficient enough to communicate patient information in Japanese. Fellows are constantly challenged to speak English as well as understand cultural differences between the Japanese and NMRTU Sasebo patients. Military family and Service members come from all over the world – not just America – providing significant racial, language, religious, and cultural diversity that you may not be accustomed to when practicing medicine in Japan. NMRTU Sasebo staff are always available and happy to assist with questions about a particular problem regarding English (conversational, medical, or military). We are confident that every Japanese Fellow will see an improvement in English proficiency by the end of their time here.

Expectations

Most daytime (0730-1600, Mon-Fri) transfers from the clinic, if not emergent, will be handled by the medical translators. A transfer requires a Fellow to attend the patient, discuss the case with the attending doctor, a patient evaluation (history and physical), notify the anticipated accepting facility to secure a Japanese accepting physician, and accompany the patient to the hospital. The majority of emergent patients are sent to Sasebo City General (SOGO) Hospital, which is approximately a 4 minute ride away. This will take precedence over any other tasks. If called, the Fellow is expected to and facilitate the transport as quickly as possible.

Rotations

Although Fellows are not credentialed to independently care for patients at NMRTU Sasebo, they actively participate in patient care with an attending doctor throughout each rotation. Fellows are offered many opportunities to practice history taking, physical exams, presentations, scribing, and

participate in procedures alongside the attending doctor in accordance with the laws and regulations of the United States. Fellows will do most rotations at NMRTU Sasebo, but can expect to rotate through other military facilities, NMRTU Iwakuni and NMRTC Yokosuka, too. The Academic Coordinator will take the Fellow's preferences into deep consideration when setting up the Fellow's rotation schedule.

Medical Home Port

Medical Home Port (MHP) is an interdisciplinary health care team that works in partnership to provide comprehensive and coordinated care. Many of the rotations are in this department and this is where Fellows spend a significant amount of time. Each workday, Fellows will be assigned a provider and patients start being seen at 0740. There is a MHP morning huddle at 0700 on Mondays and Fridays where everyone in primary care gathers and discusses updates, plans, and other relevant clinic information. On Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, the corpsmen meet with the providers at 0705 to review the schedule. Lunch generally is 1200–1240. Afternoon clinic is generally 1240-1600. Providers may have the Fellow see each patient with them or every other patient, depending on provider efficiency and patient desire. This is a teaching facility and patients understand that sometimes students will interact with the patients. However, most providers will ask the patient for permission for the Japanese Fellow to see them with the provider.

Teaching Conferences and Educational Forums

A great opportunity to formally present a case in English to medical staff from NMRTU Sasebo, local Sasebo hospitals, and Japan's Self Defense Force.
- Monthly medical exchange with SOGO Hospital Residents
Knowledge and linguistic medical exchange with local medical residents. Focused on familiarizing Japanese residents to military medicine.

Basic Life Support (BLS) Advanced Cardiovascular Life Support (ACLS) and Pediatric Advanced Life Support (PALS) are available to interested Fellows.
